Age Group/Team First Aiders.	All mini, junior and senior teams have designated first aiders and the relevant and approved first kits. All first aiders are trained to a minimum of Level 3 EFAW. The physio and sports therapists are also first aid qualified.
Ambulance Access Point.	Two entrances to the ground which are both off Mill Street (A442). Height restriction barrier to Severn Park which will need to be opened. Once on site, the ambulance will be directed to the appropriate location/pitch by designated volunteers.

First Aid Bags.	Each team has a first aid bag.
First Aid Room.	Physio room within the changing area.
Defibrillator (AED)	Public access AED in a locked cabinet at the pedestrian entrance to the clubhouse. Registered with the ambulance service. Code C159X
Other equipment.	Major Bleeding pack within the bar area in the clubhouse.

MEAP Chain of Command & Procedures.	IN THE EVENT OF A LIFE THREATENING OR SERIOUS MEDICAL EMERGENCY, DO NOT DELAY IN CALLING 999.
	The safety of everyone takes priority and consideration should be taken if the game or training should be stopped.
	The first aider/PHICIS designated to that team will take charge of assessing and providing care to that player. Other first aiders if required will be requested by the coach or the first aider.
	If deemed necessary that an emergency ambulance is required to attend, the coach, a first aider or other designated person at that time will call 999. It is important that the person calling 999 is near to the patient. If a 999 call has been made, then someone will be sent to the main road to wait for and direct in the ambulance service.
	In the event that the ambulance service states that the Air Ambulance is responding, ALL PLAY ON ALL FIELDS MUST STOP AND THE AREA CLEARED OF ALL PEOPLE & OBJECTS.
	All first aid carried out will be within the scope of that first aider/PHICIS practitioner; care advice may be given by the ambulance service while on the phone.
	The coach of the team will be responsible for the wellbeing of the rest of the team while any first aid is being carried out.
	Depending on the nature of the illness or injury, it may be appropriate for the patient to be taken to hospital by an appropriate adult or parent of that player (if a mini or junior) The type of injury/illness will depend on which hospital is appropriate to attend, and this must be taken into account when making their own way.
	A first aider and one other appropriate adult (ideally a minimum of two people) should always be in attendance when dealing with an injured or ill player. If it is a mini or junior player, this must be followed.
	In the event of an ambulance attending the scene, the first aider will give a handover to the ambulance crew. The first aider may be required to give further information or assist the ambulance crew; it is important that the instructions of the ambulance crew are followed.
	ALL injuries or illnesses that are assessed and treated MUST be recorded on the RugbySafe reporting app.

	If an ambulance is required to attend the scene and the RugbySafe lead is not on site, then that person must be made aware of the incident at the earliest opportunity.
Head Injuries.	If a player has a head injury that does not require an ambulance response, then the following must be followed; • Assessment and treatment in line with first aid qualification and HEADCASE. • Copy of the Headcase guide given to the parent/guardian. • Head injury advice leaflet.
Post Incident.	Everyone involved to think about their own mental wellbeing; any concerns should be brought to the attention of the RugbySafe and/or Safeguarding Lead. Ensure the first aid bag is clean, restocked and fit for purpose. If the first aid room has been used, then it must be clean and in an acceptable state. Incident reported on the RugbySafe app. Post incident debrief carried out if appropriate. Any injuries requiring reporting to the RFU will be dealt with by the appropriate club representative (RugbySafe, Safeguarding or other appropriate person).
